


Examples of TTs and the rule of syllabic height sequences

<u>Variation in syllabic heights for examples by Fromkin</u>
Illustrates rule: phrasing prefers ending at low syllabic height









For clearest results phrases in all examples should be pronounced with one breath. Articulation frame can be held at word or phrase end so that frame can settle at its natural syllabic height.

Filler words

Filler words such as "man", "you know" and "like" are natural tools for inserting necessary low syllabic levels to allow fluency.
As pronunciation slowly evolves through time phrasing also needs to changing, thus currently giving rise to the spread of "like".

Example

I'm coming over
I'm like coming over

Tongue twisters reordered

Peter Piper picked a peck of pickled peppers

Peter picked a pickled Piper peck of peppers

This is a zither

This a zither is

She should sit she said

She said she should sit

Repetition of identical and near identical phonemes presents a difficulty, but breaking rule of alternating syllable heights does likewise. Modifiying the word order improves pronouncibilty.
